John F Kennedy is well known for being a Lieutenant on the Navy's PT-109 boat during World War II. He also loved sailing and owned many boats himself.

Design your own boat

During his lifetime, John F. Kennedy owned and sailed at least 10 boats. These range from Navy patrol boats to small sailboats all the way to his presidential yacht. Boats come in all shapes and sizes and are used for many purposes. If you could own a boat what would it look like? What would you use it for? How big would it be? What color would it be? On paper design your own boat. Don't forget details like how you would power your boat. What does this design say about you?



On water

President Kennedy were designed to sail on different bodies of water. Boats can be designed to sail down small rivers as well as vast oceans. Think about what type of boat you would like to build and design it on a piece of paper. Gather materials from your house and build your own boat. Next, find a body of water at home that the boat can float on. This can be your kitchen sink, a bathtub, or any other unique object that you can fill with water. Place your boat on the body of water and see what happens. Does it sink or float? Did you choose to power your boat or allow the water to move your boat? Did the materials you choose for your boat affect how it travels on water? Test your boat in different conditions such as making waves and adding weight for passengers to see how your results change.

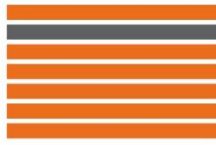


Paper Boats

Boat Routes

Boats like the PT-109 that John F. Kennedy commanded, often had to follow strict routes to reach a specific destination. These routes could be short or could take days to complete.
