

EDUCATION

Education remains a vital component of the Museum's operations, with a special focus on expanding its reach into North Texas audiences. The Education Department increased impact through programming and collaborations for students and teachers throughout the year.

The Museum offered 256 learning programs to 11,939 attendees, including teachers and students:

- 7,665 students visited the Museum in person, exceeding the Museum's initial projection of 6,500
- 496 teachers participated in on-site and virtual offerings
- 3778 students and community members participated in education and outreach programming

The most commonly consumed student education programs, in addition to on-site field trips, were:

Various conference sessions and customized presentations by Museum staff were offered to educator audiences in Regions 6, 7, 10, 11 and 12.

The number of requests for financial assistance from the Museum's Scholarship Fund, which is available to Title I schools in Regions 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, increased to 13 total schools, impacting 847 students.

During the summer, the Museum participated in the City of Dallas' Teen All Access Pass program for the first time, offering free admission to Dallas residents aged 13-17. The Museum joined ten other Dallas cultural venues including the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum, African American Museum and Dallas Arboretum and Botanical Garden in the annual program. In its first year participating, the Museum welcomed 232 local youth and their guests.

COLLECTIONS


The collections remain central to the Museum's mission, undergirding programmatic offerings. In FY2023, nearly 500 objects were added to the collection. Highlights include:

• Handcuffs, hat, (2) badge and two firearms donated by Dallas police homicide detective, Elmer Boyd, who escorted Lee Harvey Oswald while in custody at Dallas police headquarters November 22-23, 1963. The hat and handcuffs are prominently seen in several well-known news photographs (1) from that weekend.

• KRLD-TV camera #3; Image Orthicon broadcast camera used to broadcast breaking news of the Kennedy assassination investigation to a national audience via CBS News from Dallas Police headquarters on November 22, 1963.

In May, the camera was featured on CBS Evening News in a story with Omar Villafranca, who interviewed Nicola Longford, as well as retired journalist Bill Mercer who was captured by the camera informing Lee Harvey Oswald that he had been arrested for the assassination of President Kennedy in 1963. - 8mm home movie (and Argus 8mm camera used) filmed by Jack Daniel on the west side of the triple underpass immediately after the assassination: the film shows the presidential limousine overtaking the lead vehicle as it speeds toward Stemmons Freeway.
- Twenty original 35mm slides taken by Stuart Reed on November 22, 1963; images show the Kennedy motorcade on Main Street, the Texas School Book Depository shortly after the assassination, and a unique series showing the arrest of Lee Harvey Oswald at the Texas Theatre.

• Trombone played by William Cravens, a member of the Eastern Hills High School Band, at the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce breakfast on November 22, 1963, notable for being the last official playing of "Hail to the Chief" prior to the assassination. (5)

The Oral History Project, a key initiative among the Museum's collecting efforts, added 78 new interviews, including:

- 25 civil rights and social activists from across the country
- 10 authors and filmmakers
- Broadcast journalist and former NPR host Diane Rehm
- Assassination evewitness Gretchen Coben
- U.S. District Judge William Alsup, the author of The Trial of Lee Harvey Oswald: A Novel

The Museum seeks to expand underrepresented voices in the collection and actively seeks to add the perspectives of people of color, as well as others who can speak about the social history and culture of the 1960s.

The Collections Department licensed or provided collections content for use in 35 television and/or film documentaries, publications, exhibitions and theatrical productions.

Countries represented: United States, New Zealand, Spain (Catalonia), France, Germany, Australia, United Kingdom and Japan. This included several significant projects related to the 60th anniversary, which was commemorated in November 2023:

- 72 Films / National Geographic: JFK: One Day in America
- ITV / Shearwater Media: JFK The Home Movie that Changed the World
- Darwin Payne's book, Behind the Scenes: Covering the JFK Assassination

Finally, the Collections Department fielded approximately 170 research/curatorial inquiries.



SPECIAL EXHIBITION



Solidarity Now! 1968 Poor People's Campaign was a special exhibition that examined one of the most important grassroots movements of the civil rights era which culminated in a six-week, live-in demonstration on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., that attracted thousands of activists from across the nation. Protestors inhabited "a city of hope"-Resurrection City-on 15 acres between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial to call attention to the crippling effects of poverty for millions of Americans.

The exhibition explored the tactics and impact of this campaign, the first large-scale, nationally organized demonstration after Martin Luther King Jr.'s death. It featured photographs, oral histories with campaign participants and organizers, and an array of protest signs, political buttons and audio field recordings collected during the protest.

Presented at the Museum as part of a national tour, the Museum's installation and programming explored the links between the movement and the lasting legacy of President Kennedy, as well as culturally relevant themes for today. The Museum also translated the exhibition materials into Spanish.
